

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

4th April 1581

Queen Elizabeth I knighted Francis Drake aboard his ship

The Golden Hind at Deptford after his circumnavigation of the world.

5th April 1955

Sir Winston Churchill, the British leader who guided Great Britain through the crisis of World War II, retired as Prime Minister, aged 81, handing over to Anthony Eden.

6th April 1974

Swedish pop group ABBA won the 19th annual Eurovision Song Contest in Brighton, Sussex, with 'Waterloo'.

7th April 1739

English highwayman Dick Turpin was hanged in York for murdering an inn-keeper.

Before becoming a highwayman, he had been a butcher's apprentice.

8th April 2013

The death of former Prime Minister Baroness Thatcher (aged 87). She was Conservative Prime Minister from 1979 to 1990 and the first woman to have held the role.

9th April 2021

The death was announced of Prince Philip (aged 99), husband of Queen Elizabeth II for more than 70 years. He officially retired from royal duties in May 2020 after 22,219 solo engagements. The Duke was the longest reigning consort in British history and had recently been treated at King Edward VII Hospital for a pre-existing heart condition and at St. Bartholomew's Hospital for an infection.
